Accreditation is the process by which colleges and universities are evaluated and validated. Colleges and universities that have obtained accreditation have met the standards set by accrediting organisations. These organizations consist of faculty from various accredited colleges and universities. Legitimate regional and national accrediting organizations are recognized by the U.S. Department of Education (ED). Typically, the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA) recognizes the same institutions, although CHEA recognition is not mandatory. A college or university must be accredited by a Department of Education-recognized accreditation for students to receive federal financial aid. Regional accreditation is denoted high-quality education; this includes the currency curriculum, the credentials of educators, and the credibility of degrees. Regional accreditation bodies only accredit in their geographical area. What is national accreditation? National accreditation is often perceived as a less stringent standard than regional accreditation and is subject to educational accreditation bodies that are not limited by region or geography. This means that such an agency can grant accreditation to any college or university in the United States that meets its criteria. National accreditation is commonplace among business schools, religious schools, and for-profit colleges. Most regionally accredited colleges do not accept or recognize credits or degrees earned from colleges that lack regional accreditation. However, national accreditation can be a useful indicator of the quality of students engaged in vocational training, competency-based education or other educational models operating according to a profit model. Programmatic accreditation certifies that an institution's program, department or college has met the standards of the programmatic accreditation body. While programmatic accreditation bodies often have national jurisdiction, programmatic accreditation is not institutional national accreditation. In fact, programmatic accreditation often coexists with regional accreditation. In some disciplines, a degree of programmatic accreditation may even be required to earn a license or enter professional practice. When it comes to anthropology, there are no major programmatic accreditation organizations, so choosing a respected program at a school with regional accreditation can help ensure that the education you receive is of the highest standard. The easiest way to determine accreditation status is to contact your school of choice, or visit the website of any of the above accreditation bodies.
